The Robert Day School of Economics and Finance (RDS) was established in 2007 through an unprecedented gift from CMC Trustee, alumnus, and parent Robert Day '65 P'12. The School is home to the Robert Day Scholars Program—a distinguished fellowship program to both undergraduate and graduate students—and a specialized full-time Master's Program in Finance. Blending theory and practice, the curriculum offers courses in the primary fields of economics and a broad spectrum of elective courses in finance and accounting.

## THE MARIAN MINER COOK ATHENAEUM

The Marian Miner Cook Athenaeum is the "living room" of CMC's campus. The "Ath" brings the CMC community in contact with nationally and internationally prominent speakers and performers to share ideas, debate issues, and build friendships. Regular afternoon tea and special events are also part of the Athenaeum's ever-changing schedule.

## CMS ATHLETICS

CMC offers a broad and balanced program of physical education, intercollegiate competition, and intramural and recreational sports. Thirty percent of CMC students participate on 21 intercollegiate varsity teams. CMC pools its athletic resources with those at Scripps and Harvey Mudd Colleges. Students at CMC also participate in 12 club and 17 intramural sports events during the year.

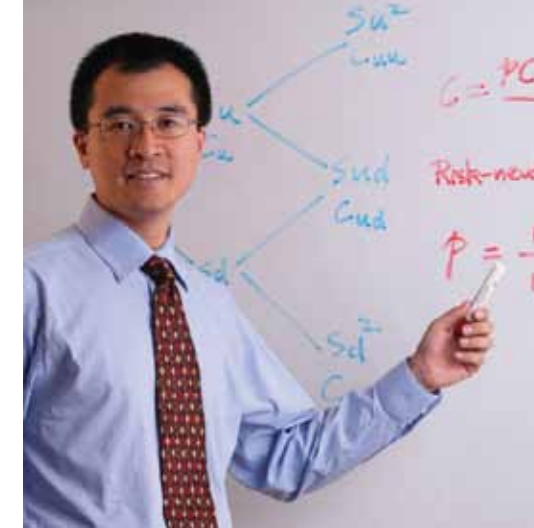
