At the World Masters Indoor Track & Field Championships at Kamloops, Canada, in March, Ernie Smith '56 placed third in the men's 75-79 shot put and javelin, returning home to Arcadia with two bronze medals. Smith reports that, in the shot, he "was super-strong and [his] adrenaline was flowing like mad." Tied with a Canadian, he locked up the bronze with his fifth attempt, securing a USA sweep in the shot and, according to Smith, "one of the biggest thrills of my life as they were playing the Star Spangled Banner."
