How do we come to know mathematics? One way is through our senses (mostly sight), which might be called intuition. This seems uncontroversial. But intuition is a complicated word with a storied past. For the past several hundred years, philosophical mathematicians have hypothesized about the types of intuitions used in mathematics. This talk will focus on the role of intuition in geometry during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. From there, I will use the lens of intuition to examine the relationship between pure and applied mathematics, the shift in mathematical values over time, and the problem of translating intuition between different languages and cultural backgrounds. I hope this talk will lead to a lively discussion about contemporary uses of intuition in your own experiences teaching and learning mathematics.
