**Program Overview:** I do not have enough good things to say about Arcadia, NZ. My program coordinators, Kate and Jane, are two of the best people I have ever met and made the transition to NZ very easy for all of us. I thought the orientation was well-planned and the mid-semester weekend trip was amazing. We got to experience so much of New Zealand through Arcadia. We would take day trips to beaches nearby, go out to Waiheke Island, drive down to Ragland to surf, and go on some great hikes and campout. a few of my friends split a car for about \$400 a piece and it was a smart investment. Auckland can get dull, it's a pretty typical city, and therefore it's good to have a way to make the 30 minute drive outside of the city center and explore all New Zealand has to offer.

**Highlights:** ROADTRIP THE SOUTH ISLAND! If you go to Auckland, do not simply stay in Auckland. Auckland can get pretty mundane and you come to know the city very quickly -- so get out and see it all. The South Island is stunning and it can be done in 2-3 weeks. Start at Abel Tasman and go around through Queenstown, Dunedin and up to Christchurch. It was the best road trip of my life.

**Advice?** Swim with the dolphins in Kaikoura. This was an incredible experience. You get the chance to swim with over 400 wild dolphins in the middle of the ocean.

Ski Queenstown, Bunjee jump in Queenstown, Skydive in Rotorua.. There are a million things to be done. Take advantage of all the adventure that New Zealand has, chances are you won't get to do it again.

Finally, meet the Kiwis. They are simply fantastic and will complete your experience. They are so friendly and have no problem showing you around or even taking you home to mom and dad. Visit a farm if you get a chance, they're awesome.
